

EXOTIC African horse sickness **Fact sheet** July 2023

Introductory statement

African horse sickness (AHS) is not found in Australia. AHS is an acute or sub-acute, infectious, insect-borne viral disease of horses, donkeys and mules.

Horses are more susceptible to AHS than mules and, generally, donkeys have a lower susceptibility. AHS is frequently fatal in susceptible horses.

The virus is transmitted by midges (*Culicoides* spp.), so there is a seasonal incidence in temperate climates. Recovered horses develop good immunity to the serotype that infected them but remain susceptible to other serotypes. Horses do not become long-term carriers.

Dogs can become infected through eating viraemic animals and usually contract a fatal form of the disease. Dogs are not a favoured host for Culicoides spp., and it is doubtful whether dogs play any role in the spread or maintenance of the AHS virus.
