

# EXOTIC Contagious equine metritis Fact sheet July 2023

#### **Introductory statement**

Contagious equine metritis (CEM) is not present in Australia. It is a sexually transmitted disease of horses that causes endometritis (inflammation of the lining of the uterus) and temporary infertility in mares. It is caused by infection with the bacterium *Taylorella equigenitalis*, strains of which vary in pathogenicity.

CEM is sometimes associated with cervicitis, vaginitis and rarely, abortion. Both sexes can be inapparent carriers of the bacteria.

CEM can be spread mechanically by contact with infectious discharges and contaminated fomites. All breeds of horses are susceptible, and donkeys can be infected experimentally.
